An observable expressed as an expectation $\mathbb{E}[w(X)]$ can be estimated by an Integral Formulation Monte Carlo algorithm.

$$\mathbb{E}[\mathsf{w}(\mathsf{X})] = \int_{\mathcal{D}} \mathsf{w}(\mathsf{x})\mathsf{p}_{\mathsf{X}}(\mathsf{x})\mathsf{d}\mathsf{x} \tag{1}$$

Where:

- w(X) is a weight function that depends on a random variable X
- $p_X(x)$ is the probability density function associated to X

Monte Carlo methods are based on:

- the Law of Large Numbers: $\lim_{N\to\infty}\frac{1}{N}\sum_{i=1}^N w(x_i) = \mathbb{E}[w(X)]$
- the Central Limit Theorem: the estimate is given with its uncertainty





$$\begin{cases} \Delta T = 0 \\ \varphi_1 \text{ known} \\ T_5 \text{ known} \end{cases} \Leftrightarrow \begin{cases} \frac{d^2 T}{dx^2} = \frac{T(x+\delta)-2T(x)+T(x-\delta)}{\delta^2} = 0 \\ \varphi_1 = -\lambda \frac{T_2-T_1}{\delta} \text{ known} \\ T_5 \text{ known} \end{cases} \Leftrightarrow \begin{cases} T_1 = T_2 + \frac{\delta\varphi_1}{\lambda} \\ T_2 = \frac{1}{2}T_1 + \frac{1}{2}T_3 \\ T_3 = \frac{1}{2}T_2 + \frac{1}{2}T_4 \\ T_4 = \frac{1}{2}T_3 + \frac{1}{2}T_5 \end{cases}$$
(2)

• The model can be seen as a system of four random variables: T_1, T_2, T_3 and T_4 .

■ The expectation $\mathbb{E}(\mathsf{T}_1)$ can be evaluated with the mean of weights through a Monte Carlo algorithm (probe computation).





How to evaluate $\mathbb{E}(\mathsf{T}_1)$ with a Monte Carlo algorithm? For each random walk i:

- Starting a point 1, the weight w_i is increased by $\frac{\delta \varphi}{\lambda}$ and the random walker moves to the point 2.
- At points 2, 3 and 4, the random walker flip a coin. If it is "head" the random walker moves to the left, otherwise, it moves to the right.
- Repeat the process while the random walker has not reached point 5 where the weight w_i is increased by T₅.



The final weight of the path is: $T_5 + n \times \frac{\delta \varphi_1}{\lambda}$ For a large number of random walks, the mean of the weights w_i tends to the expectation $\mathbb{E}(T_1)$.

- The final weight of each path is: $n \times 0 + T_5$
- \blacksquare The mean of weight is T_5 and therefore $\mathbb{E}(\mathsf{T}_1)=\mathsf{T}_5$



InterPore2023 Monte Carlo method to solve the heat equation in a complex media $_{\rm 22nd}$ May 2023

For a 3D geometry, the random walker moves on a sphere of radius δ.
The algorithm is a meshless method adapted to complex geometries.



Figure: Three conductive paths sampled with stardis in a porous media to estimate $\mathbb{E}(\mathsf{T}_{1})$. The geometry is composed of 2.8×10^{5} triangles. Sphere radius $\delta=0.014$ mm. Conductivity of the solid phase is $\lambda=5W/m.K.$



λ

The equivalent conductivity along $\vec{e_{\mathsf{X}}}$ is:

$$\overline{T}_{x} = \frac{1 \times \varphi_{I}}{T_{I} - T_{r}}$$
(4)

• Monte Carlo:
$$\bar{\lambda_x} = 4.09 \text{ W/m.K}$$

Finite volume: $\lambda_x = 3.99 \text{ W/m.K}$



Monte Carlo method to solve Laplace's equation: what about 3D geometry? 9/22

The absence of mesh becomes more and more interesting when complexity increases!



Figure: 3 conductive paths sampled with Stardis in a porous media to estimate $\mathbb{E}(T_1)$. The geometry is composed of 8×10^6 triangles. Sphere radius $\delta = 0.087$ mm.



- A Monte Carlo algorithm can easily be parallelised.
- A confidence interval can be computed from the standard deviation.
- The coupling between each random variables relies on double randomisation.



Perspectives: coupling with radiative transfer

Is the method adapted for radiative heat transfers?



Figure: δ -sphere conductive random walk coupled with a blue radiative path. The path starts at $\vec{x_0}$ and ends at \vec{y} (Tregan *et al.*, 2023).

Perspectives: coupling with radiative transfer

Taking radiation into account in transparent or participating media.



Blackbody equivalent temperature (K)

Figure: Infrared rendering of the porous media computed from Stardis software. The fluid medium is transparent and the radiative temperature is 315K. Rendering image resolution is 640 pixels \times 640 pixels. The number of paths per pixel is 500.



Taking into account advection of fluid in pores.



Figure: Advecto-conducto-radiative path in a moving fluid (Ibarrart, 2020). The velocity field is prescribed.

Express 1 + 4 as an expected value:

$$1 + 4 = \frac{1}{2} \times 2 + \frac{1}{2} \times 8 = \mathbb{E}[w(X)]$$
(5)

"Coin flipping: if I obtain "observe" the outcome of the random variable is 2, otherwise it is 8. I repeat the experiment a large number of time."





Figure: Convergence to the solution (Confidence intervals at 68 %)



In 1D

$$T(x) = \frac{1}{2}T(x-\delta) + \frac{1}{2}T(x+\delta)$$
(6)

In 3D, walk on sphere with a fixed step

$$T(0,\theta,\Phi) = \frac{1}{4\pi} \int_{4\pi} T(\delta,\theta,\Phi) d\Omega \tag{7}$$

"The average value of T over the surface of a sphere equals the value of T at the center of the sphere" (Dunn, 2011)



Radiative temperature is the temperature that corresponds to radiation balance term ψ_{R}

$$\psi_{\mathsf{R}} = \psi_{\mathsf{absorbed}} - \psi_{\mathsf{emitted}} = \int_{4\pi} d\vec{u} \int_{0}^{\infty} d\nu k_{\mathsf{a}}^{\nu} \mathsf{I}_{\nu} - \int_{4\pi} d\vec{u} \int_{0}^{\infty} d\nu k_{\mathsf{a}}^{\nu} \mathsf{I}_{\nu}^{\mathsf{eq}} \tag{8}$$

$$\psi_{\mathsf{R}} = 16k_{\mathsf{a}}\sigma\mathsf{T}_{\mathsf{ref}}^3(\mathsf{T}_{\mathsf{r}}-\mathsf{T}) \tag{9}$$

Determination of apparent conductivity tensor



Figure: Porous geometry

$$\overline{\overline{\lambda}_{\text{MC}}} = \begin{bmatrix} 4.09 & 0.56 & -0.66\\ 0.56 & 3.10 & 0.10\\ -0.66 & 0.10 & 6.96 \end{bmatrix} \qquad \overline{\overline{\lambda}_{\text{finite vol}}} = \begin{bmatrix} 3.99 & 1.22 & -1.36\\ 1.22 & 3.30 & -0.26\\ -1.36 & -0.26 & 6.73 \end{bmatrix}$$
(10)

Assuming that:

- The medium is isotropic and homogeneous
- **Thermal properties** $(c_p, \rho \text{ et } \lambda)$ do not depend on temperature
- Absence of heat source

$$\rho c_{p} \frac{\partial T}{\partial t} = \lambda \Delta T \tag{11}$$

Reformulation as an expectation:

$$T(\vec{x}, t_{obs}) = \int_0^\infty \frac{1}{\tau} e^{-\frac{u}{\tau}} du \begin{cases} T(\vec{x}, t_0) \times H(u - (t_{obs} - t_0)) \\ \int_{4\pi} \frac{1}{4\pi} d\vec{\omega} T(\vec{x} + \delta\vec{\omega}, t_{obs} - u) \times H((t_{obs} - t_0) - u) \end{cases}$$
